The LWR website and the Quilters and Kit Makers Facebook page abound with stories of hope, and photos of worship spaces and sanctuaries filled with a rainbow of quilts. What a colorful and joyous inspiration!

But as we all know, there is more to do. We encourage you to visit www.lwr.org to educate yourself and discover. You may find it is possible to match your monetary gifts by donating during a specific time period. Also, check out the new quick links along the top of the page. You will find the latest LWR news and response to COVID-19 which continues to overwhelm parts of the world.

As mentioned in the 2021 Quilt & Kit Ministry Guide, the shelves at the Lutheran World Relief warehouses in Maryland and Minnesota were empty early this spring. There is concern that there may not be enough quilts and kits on hand to fulfill upcoming needs in 2021 and beyond.

We've heard from WELCA groups in our synod and throughout the country who are starting to meet again. In many cases there is an abundance of partially completed quilts started at home, and in some cases, the quilts are finished and ready to go! Our work didn't stop during the pandemic – we just went underground, and now we are ready to burst into the light.

Below are some ideas and reminders to help you gear back up.

Quilting groups and Kit Makers:

• Continue to find creative ways to complete quilts,

- whether it is a solo effort or in small groups, at home, or at church.
- Remember Thrivent Action Teams: If you are a member of Thrivent Financial, you are eligible to apply twice each year for a \$250 grant for mission projects or aid to those in need. Associate members are eligible to apply for one project a year. Applying for the funds (www.thrivent.com) is easy online (click on the "What we Offer" tab and then on the "Generosity" tab, scroll down to "Thrivent Action Teams" and follow the apply tabs.
- Back to School season will soon be upon us. This is the perfect time to stock up on supplies for school kits.

Getting Quilts and Kits to the Warehouse:

- Consider lining up a truck and setting up an ingathering in your conference.
- Get together with another, or a few other churches in your area to fill and pack a trailer or truck, with volunteers to load and drive the quilts and kits to the warehouse.
- Use your church newsletter, bulletin, or word of mouth to ask for a volunteer from your congregation or town who would be willing to deliver the quilts and kits.

The Good Shepherd

Recently some time was spent with two of my youngest "grandbabes." We took a drive in the country to visit a sheep farm located not far from the town in which we live. As we traveled through the countryside, the allure of the green leaves on the trees was an experience to behold; they were set against a few darker green evergreens and the beauty of nature was at hand. It was awesome to see such beauty . . . God's Creation! To add to the bright green of the leaves and the sprouting of crops in the black earth all added to the beauty that we witnessed. Spring had arrived and summer is about to begin.

Before long, we came to the winding gravel driveway that led us to the farmstead and the sheep barn. The sheep barn was filled to capacity with ewes that had given birth, several weeks prior, to their sweet little lambs. The lambs were bouncing and jumping in every direction. They were so happy and their excitement in life was most evident. We stood in awe as we watched the mothers tenderly taking care of their offspring . . . giving them shelter and strength and being watchful. The natural instinct to care for their young is remarkable. We watched intensely as the sheep farmer provided

food and water for his sheep. The sheep quietly began eating the food provided for them. Once in a while a lamb would raise its head to see what's going on and we would hear the language of the sheep "blah" "blah" "blah". Then she would lower her head and begin eating again. There was a calmness and quietness that seemed so peaceful within the sheep barn. The sheep ate together with one another and enjoyed the alfalfa that the sheep farmer had piled high in the feeding trough.

The "granbabes" loved watching the sheep. They had never seen sheep before or have had the experience of being close to them. It was a great experience and one to be remembered.

In visiting with my "granbabes" following our excursion, I related the story of "The Good Shepherd". "The Good Shepherd" is Jesus Christ... and His sheep are you and me. "The Good Shepherd" is the one who loves so much and cares for us. He is always with us and he will always take care of us. As sheep follow and listen to their shepherd, we too listen and follow "The Good Shepherd". We know that a shepherd takes good care of his flock; protecting and guarding his flock from predators; on the lookout for a lost sheep, always being aware.

Jesus Christ does the same for us. "The Good Shepherd" is a miraculous healer and protector of his flock. "The Good Shepherd" would lay down his life for His sheep . . . that's you and me. Jesus made the ultimate sacrifice for us. He died on the cross so we would live with him forever. God compares us to sheep in the Bible because He views us as His priceless treasures. In John 1:29 we read that when John the Baptist saw Jesus he said, "Look, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world"!

Sheep are not the smartest animal and need a shepherd to follow. Sheep are defenseless against predators; they are afraid of moving water and can only be led to still water by a shepherd. They are especially afraid of strangers because they don't recognize the voice. They only recognize the shepherd's voice and will follow him. Sheep need a shepherd.

We only need a shepherd . . . "The Good Shepherd". We are God's sheep and we are helpless without Him! For all of us who are sheep, let us labor to be good sheep, following the voice of "The Good Shepherd"!

Mission Community/Justice

What are your summer plans this year? Do they include time with family and friends that you have not seen for a while? In the past year and a half, many special moments have been taken from us; those "in-person" connections of joyfulness, sharing and presence. Certainly, we can say they have been put on hold. With the pandemic restrictions now lessening up, we look forward to once again reuniting and catching up with one another. A "hope" that has kept us going, through a very challenging time. Now we find ourselves gathering together in a time of encouragement and gratitude.



True *hope* is a discipline, a determination to believe in God's reality and power, even when the world seems to be crashing down around us. That is the genius and power of *HOPE*. It flies in the face of calamity.

This past year has been one which we have grown in awareness, of being "woke up" if you will, to the knowledge and awareness of problems and troubles of injustice in this country and beyond. God takes the problem of injustice very seriously. Throughout the book of Isaiah, God declares that Jesus's purpose on earth was to establish justice, and He will not give up until that work is complete. In Him, we are agents of God's mission in this world. It can often be discouraging and overwhelming to consider how much injustice seems to prevail. Yet we cannot let that stop us from taking steps to join God's mission.

How can we do it? There is a biblical theme that threads throughout the Bible, and you know it well. Micah 6:8 reads, "To do justice, to love mercy and to walk humbly with our God." These are the behaviors that God is looking for in all of us. Seeking justice is central to understanding Jesus.

- We must put our hope in Him.
- We must continue to pray and not give up. It is easy to think, where is God in all this? Let's not grow impatient, God isn't finished yet. It's easy to get tired of praying for the same thing (justice) over and over again. We don't always see justice and prayer working together.
- Ask God to show us ways to care for the marginalized. What acts of mercy are you doing for your family and community?
- In God's calling, it is a matter of worship, to act justly in our day-to-day lives, not to be swayed by those who have power and those who do not.
- Feed the hungry, care for the poor, visit the sick, and encourage the discouraged (there just isn't a shortage of needs in this broken world.)

God brings justice, and our mission (in justice) is to point people to Jesus, whom God sent to establish justice.

"We are called to be a church that embraces each person and confronts racial, ethnic, cultural, religious, age, gender, familial, sexual orientation, physical, personal and class barriers that often manifest themselves in unjust treatment, inequalities, exclusion and violence." (ELCA Racial Justice Ministries)

- Dear Jesus, like the disciples of Jesus, we need to learn patience and be persistence in prayer. Help us to see your hand at work and be grateful.
- Holy One, you have made us your heir and called us from fear into hope. Grant that through the gift of the Spirit we may rely on each other so that hope may flourish.
- Holy Spirit, Come. We invite YOU to fill us with your power and presence. Forgive us for the many times we've chosen to lean on our own strength instead of Yours.

Jesus did warn that we will have trouble in this world, but He also said He has overcome the world. Nothing is too much to hope for when His power is at work within us. We shouldn't be surprised that Jesus has greater plans for us than we do for ourselves.
