## A Word from Your President

Hello to ALL Women of the ELCA here in Southwestern Minnesota! Hope your Fall is going well. In some ways it seems like this year has just passed by so quickly, which is probably a sign that my life has stayed very busy so far this year!! Amidst all the issues of our world right now, may you each find something to be thankful for in your daily lives!

Your 9 voting members of SW MN joined the 260 voting members in the first ever virtual Triennial Convention back on August 3, 4, 5. It was a new experience for most of us, but the three days were basically full of business items for the Women of the ELCA. A few constitutional changes were approved. Here's the highlights of constitutional updates:

- Participating in a congregational unit is encouraged but no longer required for leadership in either the synodical or churchwide expressions of Women of the ELCA; however, voting membership in an ELCA congregation is required.
- Reducing the number of churchwide executive board members from 21 to 15, including the four officers.
- Creating more flexibility for synodical women's organization boards: The board may number "3 or more" without requiring approval from the churchwide executive board to change the number of SWO board members.
- Allowing two members of the same congregational unit to serve as leaders of an SWO; one as an officer and the other as a board member.
- Offering more flexibility in SWO leaders' titles: leaders may be called president and vice-presidents, chairs or co-chairs, conveners or co-conveners, or coordinators.

The constitution had not originally provided for digital conventions. Voting members from the Tenth Triennial Convention (2017) were called into action and, in a mail-in ballot in July, approved a constitutional amendment to hold conventions remotely or virtually, provided participants are sufficient to constitute a quorum, thus paving the way for the historic first digital convention of Women of the ELCA!

Voting members adopted several memorials that included:

- Continuing to fight human trafficking
- Continuing to support solar energy in Liberia
- Supporting and participating in Thursdays in Black
- Encouraging the practice of using reusable bags
- Encouraging immigration reform
- Engaging in education against school violence and mass shootings
- Focusing on unjust treatment of women and girls by providing education and prayers for those who have been victimized and giving voice and support to those who willingly acknowledge such treatment by saying #METOO

We are pleased to share that the new churchwide president, Joy Michalicek, is from Region 3E, Northeastern Minnesota! Besides elections the voting members approved a 2022 budget of \$1,636,250.

The convention offering will be divided equally between Lutheran Social Services of the Southwest and the ongoing ministries of the churchwide women's organization, as designated by the churchwide board.

CONFERENCE BOARDS: Even though we are not holding a Fall Leadership Event this year, the synod board asks that your conference secretary please turn in your current listing of Conference Officers and Boards. Please get the information to the synod president and to the synod secretary. You can find our e-mail addresses at the end of this issue.

UNITS: We also ask you to keep the synod president and synod secretary up to date on your UNIT OFFICERS, so please send in your current officer and board listings. It is also important that the synod board is kept up to date on the status of each UNIT in our synod. If you know of a UNIT that has disbanded, PLEASE get that information to the synod president. An assessment of active units is to be fulfilled by the synod president. Churchwide uses the number of active units for many purposes, so it's important to know what units are active and what units have disbanded. The most important reason for knowing the number of active units in our synod is that churchwide uses the number of active units per synod to determine how many triennial voting members we are allowed to elect every 3 years. *According to* the synod constitution, Article XI, Section 5, Item 2: "Each synodical women's organization shall elect one voting member for every 25 congregational, intercongregational, or special-units (or a fraction thereof) within the synodical women's organization, and each synodical women's organization shall have at least two elected voting members in addition to the president of the synodical women's organization......" S00000....if your unit has disbanded, you need to let the synod president know! Thank you!

Addressing what constitutes an ACTIVE UNIT, here is what the Unit Constitution states: Article II, Section 2: "To accomplish the purpose of Women of the ELCA, women in this unit shall commit themselves to **a**: come together for study, support, and action; **b**: participate in the ministry of Women of the ELCA beyond the congregation; **c**: support financially the total program of Women of the ELCA; and **d**: designate leadership that shall be in communication with the synodical and churchwide women's organization."

Three conferences had plans to meet in person for their 2021 Fall Gatherings in September and October and hopefully many of you were able to participate.

The synod board has hopes to meet in person for a board meeting sometime this fall yet. A decision needs to be made on plans for a 2022 SWO Convention and make decisions on how the new constitution changes will affect our board. The 2022 convention will be a busy election year. Election of board members and officers as well as election of the 2023 Triennial voting members. So, if you receive a nomination

letter from the synod nominating committee, please give that opportunity your heartfelt prayers to want to step up and serve!

Stay safe and enjoy what's left of 2021! I'd like to end with our Statement of Purpose.

### There's a lot going on

It became a catchphrase in our department, and we would often chuckle among ourselves or keep a tally of how often he said it.

Upon hearing that a Mission Action update and article was due for the Fall Communicator, my first thought was, what can we possibly say? The spring convention and fall leadership workshop were cancelled, many local groups are not meeting or are taking summer breaks.

We've got nothing to report. There's nothing going on.

But then I thought, maybe there is just a little I could mention. The VBS day camp kids at my church packed 41 School Kits for LWR last month. My daughter and I assembled 8 Baby Care Kits this summer from items scavenged at rummage sales and thrift stores, combined with t-shirt diapers and blankets from leftover fabric I had put together. Just yesterday, one of our quilters was saying she had just made 3 quilt tops from fabric her daughter in law had cleaned from her mother's closet. And a WELCA member from a nearby community and her husband recently took a load of quilts and kits to the LWR warehouse in St. Paul. That's a little something.

Almost every day at least one person posts on the Quilters and Kit Makers Facebook page about what their church, or they individually, have accomplished. They continue to post photos of quilts and kits, and of worship spaces filled with quilts or packed boxes. That's quite a few more "somethings."

On a global scale, Lutheran Disaster Response continues to act as the hands and feet of God in the midst of earthquakes, hurricanes, fires, and other disasters. That's definitely a lot of "somethings."

Thank you to all of you, who continue to work and serve God by helping others. So, as I reconsider, there really is a lot going on.
